Livelihoods: Offering the skills and opportunity to achieve a sustainable income

Why Livelihoods?

Wherever the Need (WTN) is committed to alleviating poverty in two basic ways. To make a living people need a job, but to hold down employment they need to be healthy. There is little point in providing work if the participants are regularly sick from the scourges of the developing world: poor sanitation and polluted water. We help communities towards good health by providing sanitation, then we work on creating local jobs. We know that people want the opportunity to work their own way out of poverty and the ability to take responsibility for their own lives without needing further intervention or handouts.

Our other leaflets on sanitation and water explain how these give the basis for good health, but in this leaflet our focus is on livelihoods.

We involve local people in choosing their own livelihood project, with a strong emphasis on local sustainability. Once a WTN project is finalised, they will run it independently without outside help. Most people are happy to work hard to improve the lives of their families and their communities, and our commitment is for people to become independent not dependent. We constantly monitor progress and give advice as appropriate, but we do not support projects that rely on regular bail-out payments. Our supporters like to know that they are investing in people rather than donating to them. The communities we work with want to earn a living without having to depend on outsiders.

Generally led by Women

Our work tends to centre around women, since our experience has shown that they have a huge motivation to see their children thrive. Once they and their families have sanitation and drinking water, and no longer constantly fall ill, they have the time, energy and inclination to work. They are keen to earn enough to feed, clothe and educate their children and to create a better future for themselves.

WTN aims to create village economies that enable the inhabitants to provide for themselves. Once successful, this has a simple ripple effect on other nearby villages. As we move from one village to the next, so micro-economies are created. The communities once again become sustainable, and people do not feel the need to migrate to the cities to find work.

Many of our projects are supported with micro-finance initiatives. Micro-finance, as started by Grameen Bank, is a system whereby a group of individuals borrows a sum of money and commits collectively to its repayment. If one individual defaults, everyone else remains responsible for the loan. The repayment rate is extremely high, at over 98 per cent.

Micro-finance tends to be very successful in India, where it is a useful method of mobilising communities to set up their own businesses.

The cost of a livelihood project is variable, but can start from a little as £100 per person for a micro-finance scheme. Larger schemes can involve retraining for self-help groups to manufacture and sell their own produce direct to either retail or the end user, or introducing basic training and monitoring to introduce new practices, such as beekeeping.
